






Brohard Paw Park in Venice has been named the #1 Best Dog Friendly Beach in Florida in a recent ranking by hotel review website www.oyster.com.

PROPERTY TAXES




Example: An average single family residence located within the City of Venice with an assessed value of \$226,386 (Taxable Value of \$176,386) would receive an annual tax bill of \$3,127.20. Of that amount, the City of Venice would receive \$874.42. That equates to only \$72.87 per month.



WHAT YOUR TAX DOLLARS PROVIDE






Construction Permits



Presented in the graph above is the total number of construction permit applications and building permit fees collected since 2011. The types of permits included are building, plumbing, electrical, mechanical, and various other permits.



CASH & INVESTMENTS



The City's investment policy is governed by state statute and city ordinance. State law requires collateralization of all deposits with federal depository insurance, eligible securities, or surety bonds having an aggregate value at least equal to the amount of deposits. The City's investment policy requires the minimum collateral level to be 102% of market value of principal and accrued interest. The city is authorized to invest its surplus public funds in Local Government Investment Pools (LPIG), obligations of the U.S. Treasury, agencies and instrumentalities of the U.S. Government, and interest-bearing time deposits with banks and/or savings and loans who qualify as "authorized depositories" under Florida law. The City maintains a pool of cash and investments in which each fund participates on a dollar equivalent and transaction basis.

The primary objective of the city's cash and investment strategy is the safety of investments, including preservation and protection of the investment principal. As of September 30, 2020, the City's fair market value of its pooled cash and investments total was \$ 111,458,173 (excluding the pension trust funds).

The 2020 America in Bloom National Awards Program has named Venice the winner of the Coolest Downtown Award and the Outstanding Achievement Award for Landscaped Areas








